# **Partnership**

# ICN Business School and PAWALP join forces to strengthen women's leadership in the Pan-African agro-industry

ICN Business School is partnering with the Pan-African Women's Agro-Leadership Program (PAWALP), a non-governmental organization dedicated to empowering women in Africa's agro-industry. As part of this partnership, the school will contribute to the co-development and optimization of management training modules offered by the association, as well as facilitate connections between PAWALP and other partners, particularly in the agricultural sector. In return, PAWALP will support ICN in data collection for research projects and in designing case studies for students.



Founded in 2023, PAWALP aims to provide women with the tools and resources they need to succeed in Africa's agro-industry, a sector where their role is increasingly crucial. By working towards the economic empowerment of women, the association seeks to promote gender equality and improve food security on the continent. Present in **6 French-speaking countries** (Benin, Burkina Faso, Cameroon, Côte d'Ivoire, Senegal, and Togo), the association currently has nearly **420,000 active members**.

In addition to offering free training for women, PAWALP engages in advocacy with public decision-makers, international organizations, and financial institutions to strengthen women's integration into the agro-industry and promote inclusive policies.

# Establishing targeted and high-quality training

Having been in contact with PAWALP since 2024, ICN Business School was eager to contribute to this meaningful initiative. Following the signing of the partnership on January 23, a team of faculty researchers from the school is now working on the association's professional training and workshop catalog. Their objective: to enhance the training modules by incorporating the school's academic and technical expertise. ICN teams will help PAWALP refine key messages and tailor them to their audiences, taking into account cultural specificities, local needs, and the socio-economic dynamics of each region.

This privileged relationship with PAWALP will also raise awareness among ICN Business School students about the role of women in Africa's agro-industry. As part of various programs, students will be invited to work on case studies provided by PAWALP.

Furthermore, PAWALP will support ICN faculty researchers in research projects, including one initiated a year ago by a team of ICN and international researchers, focusing on migrant women entrepreneurs in developing countries.

ICN Business School and PAWALP are committed to strengthening their partnership in the future and plan to organize joint initiatives on March 8, in celebration of International Women's Rights Day.

- 2. Organizational Structuring: Supporting women's cooperatives in establishing strong and resilient structures.
- 3. Skills Development: Providing tailored training to help women develop technical and entrepreneurial
- 4. Market Access Facilitation: Encouraging collective strategies and digital initiatives to connect cooperatives with local and international markets.

Present in six French-speaking African countries (Benin, Burkina Faso, Cameroon, Côte d'Ivoire, Senegal, and Togo), PAWALP brings together a dynamic network of female leaders and agricultural cooperatives actively contributing to the economic and social transformation of the continent. To date, the association supports more than 800 member cooperatives in improving their structuring and competitiveness and collaborates with 18 partner ministries.



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
